Task 3

Shakespeare's plays are often put into a specific verse structure, which we call the iambic pentameter. That sounds very complicated. It isn't! 'lambic' just means that it's got two beats, I Am, with the stress on the second part, I Am. But they are in a 'pentameter', that's a five-foot line, so in each line of the verse, it goes I Am, I Am, I Am, I Am, I Am. Very simple.
